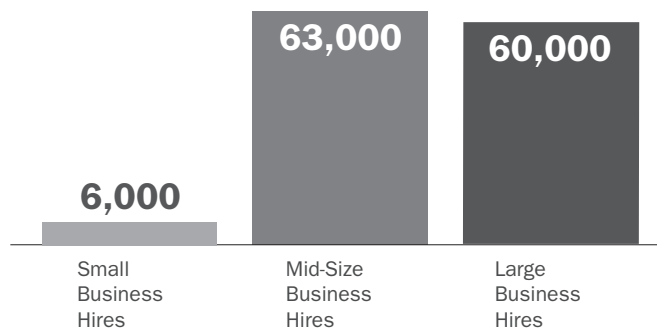

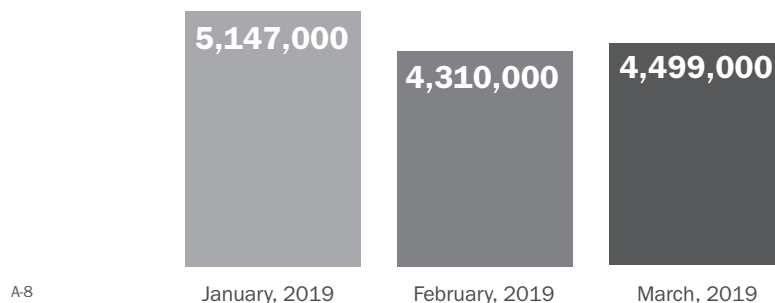

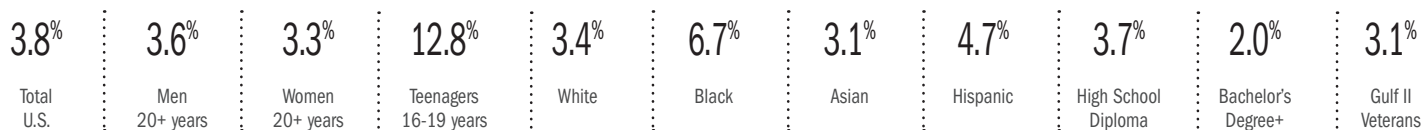

UNEMPLOYMENT RATES, MARCH, 2019¹



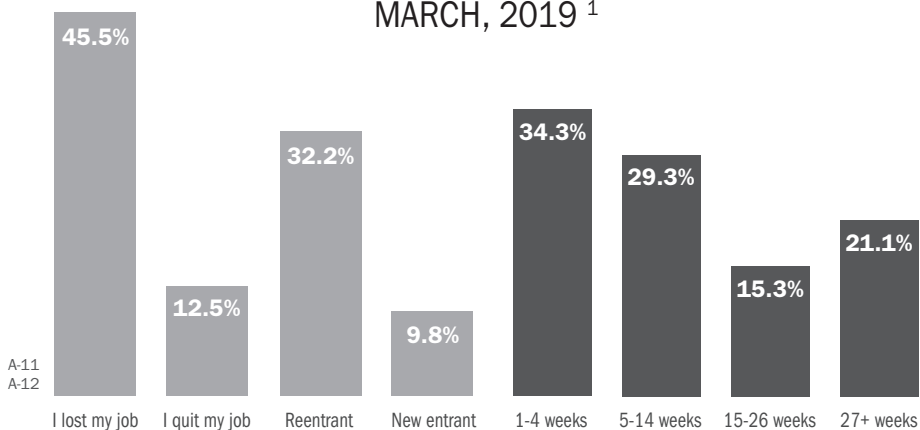

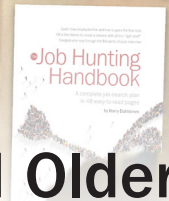

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REASON FOR JOB LOSS & LENGTH OF UNEMPLOYMENT, MARCH, 2019¹

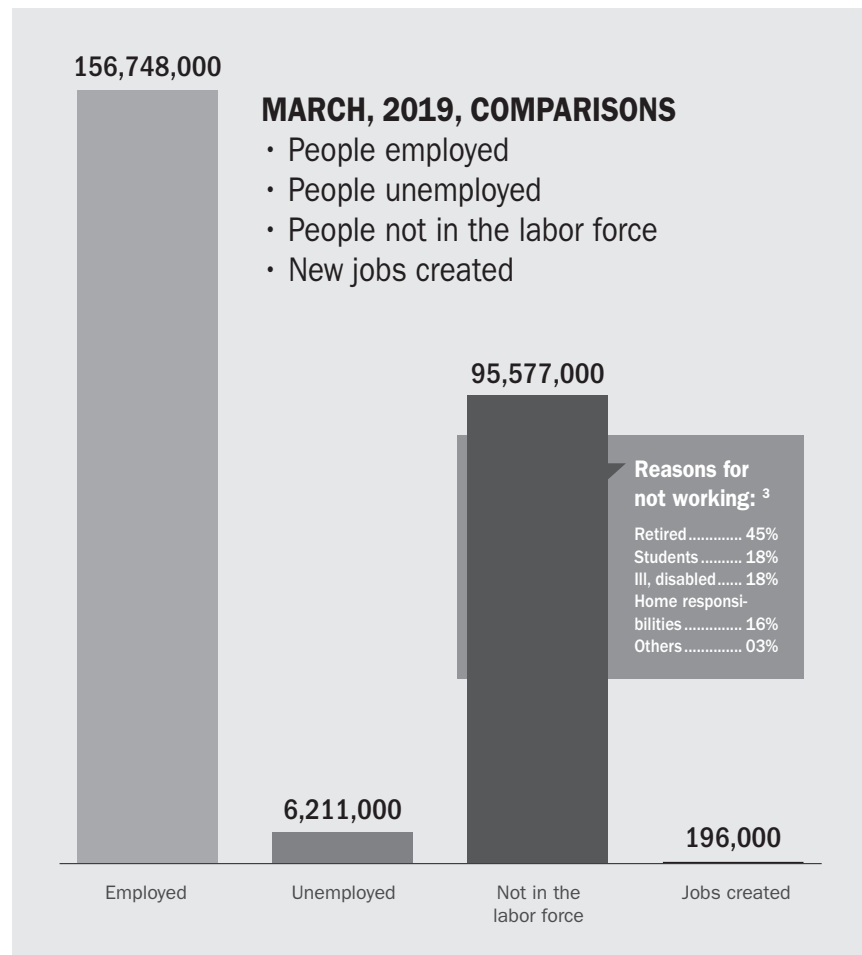
